

Significant BRAC Dates & Events:

NLT July 1, 2005:

Comptroller General shall transmit to the Congressional Defense Committees, a report containing a detailed analysis of the Secretary of Defense's recommendations and selection process.

NLT September 8, 2005:

Commission must transmit to the President a report containing its findings and conclusions based on a review and analysis of the Secretary of Defense's recommendations.

NLT September 23, 2005:

The President shall transmit to the Commission and to Congress, a report containing the President's approval or disapproval of the Commission's recommendations. If the President approves the recommendations, recommendations are binding 45 legislative days after Presidential transmission or adjournment, unless Congress enacts joint resolution of disapproval.

NLT October 20, 2005:

If the President disapproves the Commission's initial recommendations, the Commission must submit revised recommendations.

NLT Nov 7, 2005:

President's Approval or Disapproval of Revised Recommendations. The President must approve the revised recommendations and transmit approval to Congress by this date or the process ends. The recommendations become binding 45 legislative days after Presidential transmission or adjournment, unless Congress enacts a joint resolution of disapproval.

BRAC 2005 Recommendations Impact DDC

The Department of Defense (DoD) has completed its Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) 2005 process and the Secretary of Defense (SECDEF) has forwarded his recommendations to the independent BRAC Commission. Several activities in DDC are impacted. DLA and DDC are evaluating the recommendations to determine the impact on our activities operations.

BRAC 2005 recommendations are part of the critical foundation of transforming the Department's infrastructure to meet emerging missions and revised Defense strategies. The Department uses BRAC to achieve several goals: eliminate excess infrastructure, reshape our military, optimize military readiness, and realize significant savings in support of transforming the DoD. These recommendations eliminate excess physical capacity that has been diverting scarce resources from Defense capability.

The Supply & Storage Joint Cross Service Group, chaired by VADM Keith Lippert, SC, USN, Director, DLA, developed three recommendations that the SECDEF forwarded to the BRAC Commission on May 13, 2005. Each recommendation will deliver transformational change to DLA in that they require change in business processes while reducing DoD infrastructure. The recommendations are currently being reviewed by the BRAC Commission and, if approved by the President in September, will be binding near the end of 2005.

- o **All Depot Level Repairable procurement transitions to DLA**
 - o **The vast majority of consumable hardware items not managed by the Agency today will transition to DLA**
 - o **Four military Service Inventory Control Points close**
- **Net Present Value Savings: \$1.9 B over 20 years**

SECDEF has recommended the consolidation of procurement activity to achieve economy of scale in terms of better

prices and less procurement lead time. The recommendation transitions the consolidation of procurement of Class IX depot level repairables (DLR) from each Service to DLA. This also allows further consolidation of procurement actions with consumables.

For DLR procurement, there will be a transfer in-place of personnel to DLA. Also, the Services will transfer essentially all remaining consumable items to DLA for management. Examples of exceptions are design unstable items and Navy Sub-safe Level I items. For consumable item transfer, positions will move to Defense Supply Center Columbus (DSCC), Defense Supply Center Richmond (DSCR) and Defense Supply Center Philadelphia (DSCP).

Four military Inventory Control Points will be disestablished and consolidated as follows:

- Ft Monmouth (U.S. Army Communication and Electronics Command — CECOM) and Ft Huachuca (CECOM) will relocate to Aberdeen Proving Grounds.
- Rock Island (U.S. Army's Tank-Automotive and Armaments Command — TACOM) will relocate to Detroit Arsenal.
- Lackland (Cryptological Product Support Group) will relocate to Robins AFB.
- o **Management of repair depot supply operations transitions to DLA**
- o **Two additional Strategic Distribution Platforms (SDP) created from existing Distribution Depots**
- o **Two Distribution Depots close**
- o **Remaining Distribution Depots will provide only regional support**

SECDEF has recommended that retail supply, storage and distribution functions and associated infrastructure supporting depot level maintenance be transferred from repair depots to DLA. Those personnel will transfer in-place along with existing facilities.

The recommendation also establishes regional support through four Strategic
